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***The Success Trap***

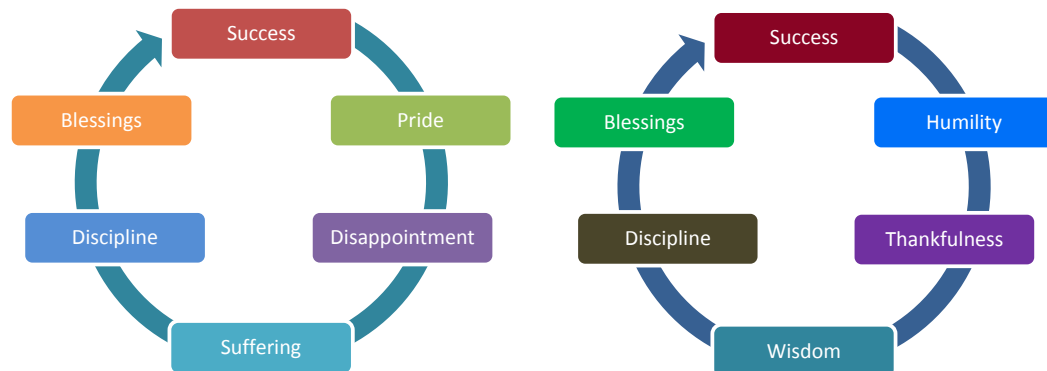
The company I lead completed a significant acquisition a few years ago during the downturn in the U.S. economy. Despite the tough economic times, this acquisition was an opportunity to dramatically improve our competitive position and chart a course toward growth and prosperity. However, the integration activities, combined with a weak economy, took their toll on our people and created a challenging environment for the first two years after the acquisition.

As a faith-friendly company, we had plenty of people praying for better times. As the CEO, I felt like I was facing one of the most challenging times of my career. We had great people, a solid business platform, and a good plan, but the overall financial results were disappointing. I found myself on my knees quite often asking for God's wisdom and that His will be done in all of our affairs.

Year three unveiled a much different story as the fruits of our labor began to flow through to our financials, and the overall momentum of the business changed for the better. Much of what we had been praying for, along with all of our hard work and discipline, was now paying off.

It quickly became clear to me that this would be my greatest leadership challenge to date—dealing with success and the rewards that follow.
